<b>Brief Summary:</b>	<p><b>Day 1: Gond Art Workshop by Artist Venkat Raman Shyam</b></p> <p>The first day of the workshop was dedicated to exploring the vibrant and intricate art form of Gond Art, guided by the renowned artist Venkat Raman Shyam. The session began with an introduction to the origins of Gond Art, a traditional tribal art form from Madhya Pradesh. The artist emphasized its connection to nature, folklore, and cultural symbolism, explaining how the Gond community traditionally used art as a means of storytelling and expression.</p> <p>Participants were introduced to the basic techniques of Gond painting, including the use of bold outlines and detailed patterns. Venkat Raman Shyam shared insights into selecting natural motifs like animals, trees, and deities, which are central to this art form.</p> <p>The artist demonstrated the step-by-step process of creating a Gond painting, starting with sketching the primary subject and layering it with vibrant colors and intricate patterns.</p> <p>A hands-on activity followed, where participants created their own Gond-inspired artwork under the artist's guidance.</p> <p>Venkat Raman Shyam also discussed his journey as an artist, inspiring participants to explore their own creativity.</p> <p>The session concluded with a discussion and feedback, leaving participants with a deeper appreciation for this ancient yet evolving art form.</p> <p><b>Day 2: Phad Art Workshop by Artist Prakash Joshi</b></p> <p>The second day focused on the colorful world of Phad Art, conducted by the acclaimed artist Prakash Joshi. This Rajasthani art form, known for its storytelling tradition, revolves around narratives from local legends, particularly those of Pabuji and Devnarayan.</p> <p>Prakash Joshi began the session by explaining the historical and cultural significance of Phad painting, traditionally created on cloth and used as a medium for storytelling by traveling bards.</p>
